A FORMER Chatham High School student is leading a multi-national team of scientists working on groundbreaking research in the Goulburn River catchment атеа.

Dr Jeffrey Walker, now of the University of Melbourne. is head of the 30-strong team that is working with farmers. in a co-operative effort to improve the spatial resolution and accuracy of remote sensing of soil moisture.

The group includes scientists from the United States' National Aeronautical Space (NASA). Agency European Space Agency and representatives of other European universities and institutes.

The aim of the work is to allow farmers access on-line via satellite to high quality real-time data about their soil and forecasts to enable more informed decisionmaking.

The work is especially important given the ongoing issue of water availability in Australia and its effective use in agriculture.

Dr Walker left the region to advance his studies in Victoria and still has proud family members and friends in the Manning.
